Criteria for Trade Fair booth judging

Every year, the judges at the Trade Fair have a tough job awarding the ribbons, and this year the competition could be even tougher!

In the judging process, single commercial booths compete against other single spaces; two or more spaces compete against each other; non-profit against non-profit; and food booths against food booths. Since there are so many single-space booths, some ties will occur.

Points are awarded in the following categories, on a one to five basis, with 20 being a perfect score:

- Clarity of Name Do you know immediately what their business is?
 - Eye Appeal Color, neatness, best use of space
 - Friendliness of People in Booth Do they smile and greet people?
 - Originality

Each booth is evaluated by three judges, who then add their scores, Thus, 60 points gets a blue ribbon, and so on.

How Can Women Make Financial Progress

On March 8, we observe International Women's Day. This year's theme is "Press for Progress," and events around the world will celebrate women's advancements in the political, social and cultural arenas. parent, according to a Princeton University study.

What, then, can you do to help ensure a comfortable retirement and achieve your other financial goals? Here are a few suggestions:

Take full advantage of your employer's retirement plan. If your employer offers a 401(k) or similar retirement plan, take full advantage of it. Invest as much as you can afford each year, and every time you get a raise, increase your contributions. At the very least, put in enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered.

Invest for the long term. Some evidence shows that women may be more conservative investors than men. But if you want to reach your long-term goals, you will need to consider some growth-oriented investments in your portfolio, factoring in your risk tolerance and time horizon. You may want to consult with a financial professional about the best way to invest for the long term.

Maximize your Social Security. If your spouse is the higher earner, you may

want to consider how you can use this disparity to your advantage when you collect Social Security. Specifically, you may be eligible for Social Security benefits based on your spouse's earnings and Social Security record. You'll want to consult your tax advisor before making any moves.

Protect yourself from long-term care costs. More than two-thirds of nursing home residents are women, according to the National Center for Health Statistics. And the median rate nationwide for a private room in a nursing home is over \$97,000 per year, according to the Genworth 2017 Cost of Care Survey. Medicare generally pays very little for long-term care, so if you ever need these services, you'll have to find other ways to pay for them. A financial professional can suggest some ideas.

As a woman, you face special financial challenges, and striving to overcome them will be a lifelong activity. But it's worth the effort.

Am I covered for this?

You and your spouse have worked so hard to afford the two brand new vehicles, beautiful home, some toys such as a motorcycle, snowmobiles, ATV's, and a jet ski. BBA TRADE FAIR - "FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS"

- Q. Does BBA need help getting the high school ready for the Trade Fair set-up on Friday night?
- A. YES! Please come Friday, March 9, at noon. We need help with tables, chairs, taping, putting signs up, etc. Lunch will be provided for workers only. Please call or email the BBA office with your name, place of business and number of volunteers so that we have an accurate count for ordering food.
- Q. Can I help with clean-up?
- A. YES! Absolutely! Just stay after you get your booth torn down and pitch in where ever you can, or ask Jan Howard OR Brad LaVoy what needs to be done.
- Q. How high are the back-drops?
- A. Back-drops are 8 foot high.
- Q. What color is my back-drop going to be?
- A. Tentatively, these are the colors that you can expect. The GYM #2 will have BLUE for the booths on the outside perimeter and GOLD for the booths that are back-to-back in the center. The GYM #1 will have WHITE for the booths on the outside perimeter and RED for the booths that are back-to-back in the center. The HALLWAYS, booth numbers 101 through 115 will have BLUE back-drops, and booth numbers 116 through 132 will have GOLD back-drops. BBA reserves the rights to change back-drop colors without notice.
- Q. Does BBA provide the table cover for the table(s) in my booth?
- A. NO. We provide the back-drop, table and chairs. You provide the decorations, table cover, skirting, extension cords, etc. Here's a helpful hint. Metal shower hooks work great for hanging your sign in your booth.
- Q. When is Trade Fair set-up?
- A. Friday, March 9, from 4:00-8:00 p.m. (No early birds please EXCEPT FOR HELPERS)
- Q. Can I set up early on Friday?
- A. **NO!** (Please refer to the part above about no early birds!) If you are using a car in your display or have a <u>VERY LARGE</u> display, contact the BBA office at (734) 850-2200 to make special arrangements.
- Q. What size is my table?
- A. You have the option of a 6 or 8 foot table. Please indicate which size you would like on your application form.
- Q. Can I take my booth down before 4:00 p.m. on Sunday?
- A. <u>NO! ABSOLUTELY NOT!</u> Your booth should remain intact for the entire duration of the Trade Fair. Early breakdown will cause additions fees for your next Trade Fair.
- Q. Does BBA provide electrical cords?
- A. NO. If you are using electricity, you are expected to provide your own 50-foot extension cords.
- Q. If I signed up for Banner Advertising do I have to hang my own banner?
- A. NO. The BBA will hang all banners and will determine final placement for all banners. EVERY effort will be made to ensure potentially competing banners will not be hung over businesses in common.

2018 TRADE FAIR RULES

- 1. All exhibitors/workers (excluding food vendors) are requested to park away from the entrances.
- 2. All booths must be paid in full at sign-up. No refunds on booths.
- 3. Assigned space limited to the business registered for that space only no others are allowed. Please keep display inside your tape marked space.
- 4. Booths are to be set up by 8:00pm Friday evening. All displays are to remain in place until 4:00pm on Sunday and to be manned at all times during the open hours of the fair. Please do not take your display down early. Early breakdown will cause additional fees for your next Trade Fair.
- 5. Exhibitor advertising is limited to registered booth space only no others permitted.
- 6. The approximate booth size for the Gym #1 and the main hallway is 10 ft. wide by 6 ft. deep. The booth size in the Gym #2 is approximately 10 ft. wide by 8 ft. deep. If electrical service is required, please bring your own 50-foot extension cords.
- 7. Sides of booth display should be no taller than 4-1/2 ft. from the floor on the front half of the booth and the back wall of the booth should not exceed the height of the back drop (8 ft.), unless approved by the Trade Fair chairperson. No unfinished sides or backs.
- 8. Please take care to protect the floors from scratches and liquid damage, especially in the gym. Food is to remain in the cafeteria. Businesses are responsible for any damage to school property and will have to reimburse the school for repair of such damage.
- 9. All literature and signs advertising your business must show your Bedford address.
- 10. No Solicitation or advertising by any businesses allowed outside of booth area during the Trade Fair including BBA members.
- 11. No animals allowed, unless approved by the Trade Fair committee.
- 12. All booths will be judged on Saturday morning and ribbons will be awarded.
- 13. Mascots are allowed for Trade Fair participants only.

14. Mascot General Rules:

- a. Mascots cannot stop for pictures directly on either side of any isle as to block another booth.
- b. Mascots should attempt to have pictures taken in areas where the isles are wider.
- c. All mascots must have a handler present with them to guide them through busy congested areas as to avoid bumping in to or stepping on small children.
- d. Mascots shall make every attempt to stay away from directly competing businesses that are displaying at the trade fair. If seen or warned about this, the mascot will be banned from the balance of the trade fair without refund of mascot fee.
- e. Mascots will be **PRE-APPROVED** and must have a picture of their costume presented 30 days prior to the trade fair opening day.

Proposal to eliminate no-fault insurance system will provide significant savings to MI drivers

After a proposal to reform our state's auto insurance system failed last year, I immediately began working on another proposal. This proposal eliminates the no-fault system and moves Michigan to a full-tort system similar to other states such as Ohio. In early February, several of my colleagues joined me in sponsoring an eight-bill package that will bring significant relief to drivers paying the nation's most expensive insurance premiums.

Auto insurance rates are the number one issue I hear about – whether it is a phone call, an email, or a conversation in the grocery store; people want lower rates. It is obvious to drivers across the state facing severe financial stress that we've got to do something to fix this broken system and lower rates for all drivers.

House Bills 5517-5523 still mandate that all Michigan drivers have insurance, but the legislation provides more choice and flexibility by eliminating the mandate to buy unlimited medical coverage. Accident victims will have the ability to sue at-fault drivers for economic damages and non-economic damages such as pain and suffering.

Many question whether this is the right thing to do in Michigan. To that, I reply that there are 38 other states that operate WITHOUT a no-fault system. Colorado abandoned its no-fault system in 2003. According to one study, the average car insurance premium in that state decreased 35 percent since moving to a tort auto insurance system. Michigan drivers could see greater savings by parting ways with its no-fault system, which is the only one in the nation mandating unlimited medical coverage. Florida, one of the 12 states operating with a no-fault system, is also debating repeal.

Repealing Michigan's no-fault system and replacing it with a tort system will also draw more insurance companies to the state, which will, in turn, create more competition to even further drive down insurance rates.

Decreasing auto insurance rates will have an impact on local businesses too. More money in the pockets of our residents means more flexibility to purchase goods and services from our neighborhood shops.

While the debate over our auto insurance rates has gone on for years and many proposals have failed to advance, it does not mean that we should stop working to provide a better system. One thing is clear: our current system is broken and I will continue my fight to fix it.

BBA seeking scholarship applicants

In an effort to encourage the pursuit of higher education, the Bedford Business Association annually awards scholarships to individuals residing in Bedford Township, who are seeking higher education and meet BBA scholarship qualification guidelines.

The BBA will be awarding four \$500 scholarships this spring. To qualify for one of these scholarships you must be planning on pursuing a higher education in the form of a certificate, 2-year degree or 4-year degree program. A high school diploma/GED must be received by June 2018. A minimum 3.0 GPA is also required. Home schooled, private and parochial students are eligible to apply for a scholarship.

Those wishing to be considered for a scholarship are required to fill out a BBA application form that can be found on the BBA website. A high school/GED or college transcript that includes current courses is also required. Additionally, the applicant will need to write an essay that is 300 words or less in length and describes their career objectives, their financial need and why they are deserving of a scholarship. Lastly, a letter of recommendation from someone such as a teacher, counselor, advisor or coach, etc. is to be included.

The completed application form and additional requirements are due by Monday, April 9. They can be dropped off at the BBA office, located at 8204 Secor Rd. in Lambertville.
